Teaching Areas of Interest

Undergraduate Teaching, Cal Poly Pomona

- ENG 2883 Women Writers (4 sections): A general education course focused on Early English Feminism that traces writers who claim authority through spirituality, sexuality, education, politics, philosophy, and literature. Students spend a portion of the class on feminist literary history.
- ENG 2883H Women Writers Honors (2 sections): A general education course for students enrolled in the honors college, focused on the monstrous feminine. Students explore this trope through film, graphic novels, prose, nonfiction, and poetry.
- ENG 3000 Intro to Literary Studies (4 sections): Literature majors and minors orient themselves to literary studies with work on research methods and advanced composition using texts such as *The Woman of Colour, Belinda, Everything Under*, and Phillis Wheatley's poetry.
- ENG 3010 Literary Theory and Cultural Studies (13 sections): Literature majors and minors discuss the rationale for using theory in literary studies and are introduced to intersectional feminism through structuralism, anti-racist theory, feminist theory, queer theory, and Marxism.
- ENG 4110 Technologies of Writing (1 section): A general education course that examines writing technologies from cuneiform to desktop publishing; students replicate processes such as letterpress in the Maker Studio before completing "unessays" on book forms.
- ENG 4411 English Education Teaching Practicum (2 sections): Supervision of students' Early Field Experience hours as they work toward a single-subject teaching credential in English.
- ENG 4501 Milton (1 section): This class teaches the context of John Milton's poetry, prose, and epics. Students deconstruct Milton's position in the canon as the "Dead White Guy" through his appropriation into English national identity and by Black writers like Phillis Wheatley.
- ENG 4502 British Renaissance (1 section): Students explore debates in Early Modern literature with race, gender, and modernity; technologies of writing; and authorship. Includes making workshops such as writing with quills, binding pamphlets, paleography, and manuscript circulation.
- ENG 4510 British Enlightenment (2 sections): The course focuses on the creation and impact of Enlightenment ideologies and how identities are constructed in response to changing ideas about rationality, civilization, nationality, and categories of race, class, and gender.
- ENG 4512 British Victorian Age (1 section): This course explores how literature in Victorian England signifies "monstrousness" as deviant sexuality, anxieties about race and the Other, and fears of globalization. Students create their own Victorian RPG games.

Undergraduate Teaching, Cal Poly Pomona (cont.)

ENG 4521 The Novel in English (1 section): A formalist course that traces the "rise of the novel" in Anglophone literature from the seventeenth century that traces depictions of sex work and pornography to explore textual and psychological intimacy and erotics in early novels.

ENG 4881 Intersectionality and Literature (2 sections): This course considers the significance of *This Bridge Called My Back* within post-Civil Rights radical feminism. We consider the roots of this transformative volume and its impact on contemporary discourses such as intersectionality.

Graduate Teaching, Cal Poly Pomona

ENG 5400 Professionalization Practicum (5 sections): Supervision of a cohort of master's students who participate in professionalization activities to prepare them for their chosen careers.

ENG 5562 British Literature 1660-1800 (2 sections): This course deconstructs English identity with the critiques of critical indigenous studies, critical race theory, and feminist theory. Students practice computational methodologies through a mapping project.

ENG 5880 Special Topics in Literature (1 section): A course on Jane Austen in adaptation that blends a study of adaptation theory with film and literary analysis, media studies, and theories of gender, race, class, and sexuality. Students track *Emma* and *Pride and Prejudice* in film, remixes, and games.
