Betrayal in the Era of COVID

Throughout the pandemic, doctors, nurses and other healthcare workers were celebrated as "heroes". This form of address came even as those same healthcare workers felt needlessly endangered by precarious working conditions. The metaphoric framework of pandemic as war resulted in valorization, but also in the roll calls of the fallen. Dr. Goyal will explore the narrative and discursive possibilities afforded by the idea of the hero in the setting of moral injury and institutional betrayal.
